

Social Media Conduct Guidelines for Habitat Hype Team Volunteers

- Tag Twin Cities Habitat for Humanity when you post about us! This helps more people find our official social media pages and learn more about what we do.
- Remember that your posts about Twin Cities Habitat can reflect on our organization. Take care to be **respectful and positive** in your social media interactions.
- Share accurate information about Twin Cities Habitat. If someone in your social network has questions about Habitat that you're not sure how to answer, you can tag our official pages or encourage them to contact us directly.
- Encourage open, honest, and respectful discussions about affordable housing and Habitat's work. A respectful social media presence does not mean disagreements and conflicts will be absent. Healthy conflict may occur in social media interactions. We ask Hype Team volunteers to strive towards understanding and respect for the viewpoints of others.
 - Respectfully engage with concerns or misperceptions about affordable housing or Twin Cities Habitat's work in order to create greater understanding and awareness if you feel comfortable doing so.
 - Don't get involved in comment wars and personal attacks online. Respond with positivity, understanding, and the facts about Twin Cities Habitat— or simply don't respond! You can refer commenters to our official pages or encourage the person to contact Twin Cities Habitat directly with their concerns.
- **Do not engage in harassment, bullying, or threats.** We ask all in-person volunteers to adhere to our Respectful Workplace policies, and we expect the same level of respect for Habitat staff, fellow volunteers, clients, and community members from our virtual volunteers.
 - Harassment is defined as conduct or comments that have the purpose or effect of interfering with an individual's safety. The conduct or comments that could be harassment may include:
 - Slurs, epithets, or insults
 - Sexual comments and conversations
 - Demeaning or belittling comments or jokes
 - Displays of offensive or demeaning images, cartoons, or stories
 - Bullying is a negative conflict that is generally characterizes as overbearing
 mistreatment and unwanted behavior that involves real or perceived imbalance of
 power. It inflicts physical, mental, and/or emotional harm and is often repetitive in
 nature and habitual.
 - Threats of violence are expressed or implied threats to interfere with an
 individual's health, safety, property, or enjoyment of work duties, which causes a
 reasonable apprehension that hard could occur. Abusive behavior, whether
 verbal, psychological, or physical, are also considered violence.
